BPD Mission Statement

“It is the mission of the Belvidere Police Department to provide a safe living, learning, and working environment to all citizens and visitors to the City of Belvidere. The members of the Belvidere Police Department will work with all person(s) or groups to enforce, educate, and assist in the prosecution of all violations of laws and ordinances to assure these safe environments.”

•Attention Areas – Year 2009

Traffic Safety: Crosswalk enforcement, stop sign and speed limit compliance through Traffic Unit details, IDOT Grants, Speed Trailer and on-duty patrol activity.

Community Policing: Increased partnerships with the citizens through Citizen Police Academies, VIPS (Volunteers in Police Service), Neighborhood Watch and the development of an e-mail Alert and Information System (Nixle).

Gang Enforcement: Addition of two GIU Officers (for a total of 14) as the Department continues with its commitment to eliminate drug and gang activity. The Department gang database was redeveloped for greater efficiency. This database is also utilized by the Boone County Sheriff's Department and Corrections.

Shift Coverage: Increased police coverage with the addition of a 10am-10pm cover shift. This shift, along with a 12pm-12am cover shift and a 3pm-3am K-9 Unit, puts more officers on the street during the higher calls-for-service times.

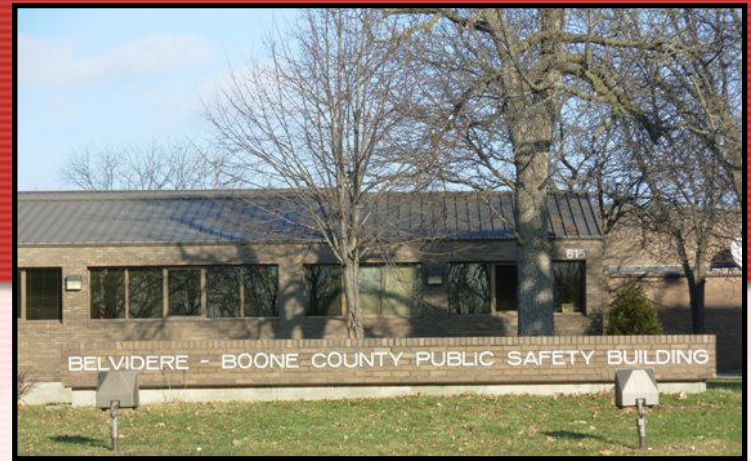

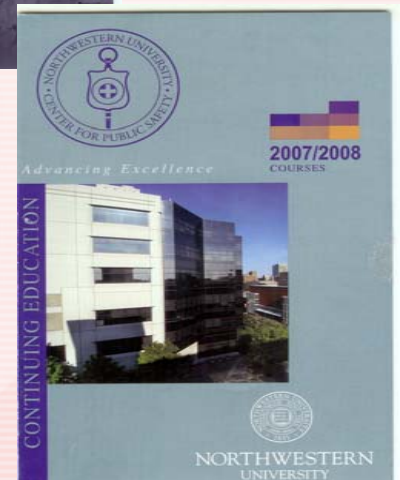
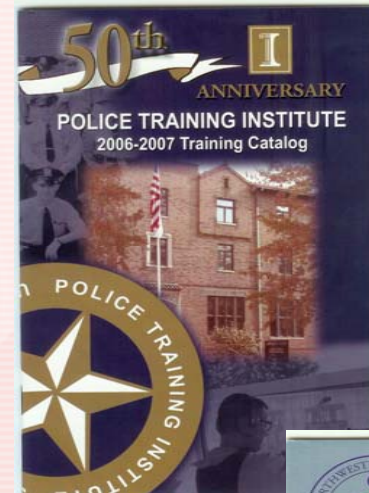

Detective Division General Cases



- Investigate crimes involving: Robbery, burglary, property recovery, fraud, identity theft, forgery, auto theft, traffic homicide, sex crimes and missing persons.
- Additionally, provide for secondary responses to crimes such as suicides, kidnappings, carjacking and dignitary protection.

Detective Division Narcotics Unit

- **Maintain ongoing relationships with the FBI, DEA, SLANT and Rockford Metro.**
- **Responsible for collecting, evaluating and analyzing available data to support investigations involving illegal trafficking of controlled substances.**
 - **Primarily focuses on street level drug enforcements, but also long term investigations including major suppliers to the metro Belvidere area.**
- **Additional Responsibilities:**
 - **Department paperwork relating to seizures of cash, vehicles, property and other items**
 - **Also responsible for reviewing all seizure submissions for completeness.**

DEA Task Force

- **The task force was started by the DEA in 2003 for the purpose of long term narcotic investigations.**
- **The task force was developed to disrupt the illicit drug traffic in the Rockford area by immobilizing drug trafficking organizations.**
- **The task force is made up of officers from local police, sheriff's and federal law enforcement agencies.**
- **The task force was formed because police agencies were unable to conduct long term narcotic investigations due to manpower and/or financial burdens.**

Detective Division Stats

- **In 2009, the Detective Division had 409 General Case and Drug Unit investigations.**
- **Incidents required 148 callouts of off-duty detectives for a total 528 hours compared to 160 callouts in 2008 for 554 hours.**
- **The Detective Division General Case Unit and Drug Unit made 170 arrests.**

Other Detective Division Stats

- **The Auto Theft Investigator conducted 54 new investigations (20 BPD Cases) of vehicle theft in 2009; 17 arrests were made and 36 vehicles were recovered.**
- **Sex Offender Registrations totaled 56 registered in 2009, compared to 48 registrations in 2008.**
- **There were 22 background investigations conducted: 14 police, 4 fire and 4 liquor license applications.**

Gang Intervention Unit

Sergeant Mark Pollock supervises 14 assigned officers in this unit.

- **Responsible for the suppression and elimination of street gang activity and their illegal involvement with narcotics.**
- **Intensive intelligence gathering, communication and cooperation with other police agencies and federal law enforcement agencies.**
- **Aggressive investigations in areas frequented by street gang members**

Gang Intervention Unit

The Gang Intervention Unit conducted 75 details from March 13, 2009 through November 1, 2009 resulting in:

- **588 documented contacts**
- **45 arrests**
- **53 persons ticketed**



Elderly Services Unit

- **Established in 1997 to meet the growing concern of crimes against the elderly.**
 - **Deputy Chief Falkenstein and Officer Leenheer, continue to receive additional training in this area. They coordinate all activities with the seniors of the community.**
 - **S.A.L.T (Seniors and Law Enforcement Together) was formed to improve the overall coordinated response to elderly victims of crime, and focus on the safety of the victim and the accountability of offenders.**

- **The Triad –
An Integral Part of Community Policing:**
 - **The Chief of Police, Sheriff and Boone County Council on Aging work together for this primary goal.**
 - **Provides opportunity for exchange of information between law enforcement and senior citizens.**
 - **Focuses on reducing unwarranted fear of crime and improving quality of life.**

Northern Illinois Auto Theft Task Force

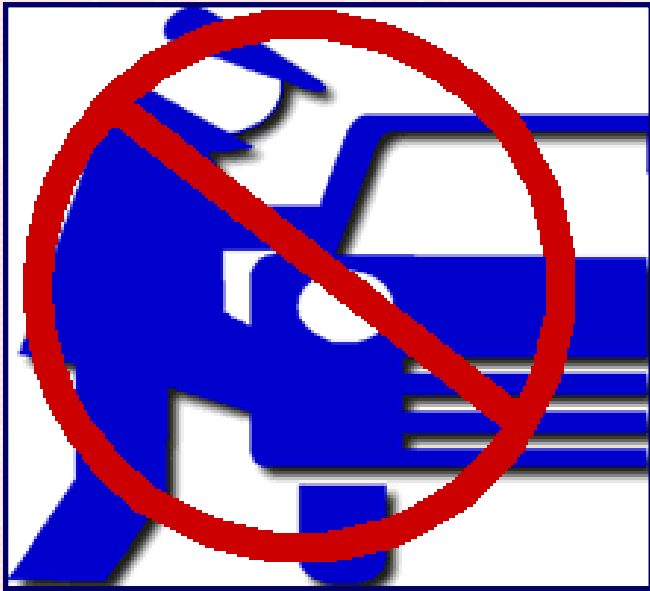

- A proactive stance in the collection of intelligence information regarding suspected motor vehicle theft offenders by utilizing various investigative resources including surveillance, informants and tips provided by citizens.
- Goal is to continue investigations, gather intelligence, process recovered vehicles, apprehend offenders and share information with all law enforcement agencies within Winnebago and Boone County, ultimately reducing the problem for all agencies involved.

Northern Illinois Auto Theft Task Force

- **Created in 1993 to identify and target felony auto theft conspiracies in Winnebago and Boone Counties.**
- **Officer Staples was assigned to this unit from 2004 - 2009. Officer Moore was assigned in May, 2009.**
- **Grant monies received from the IL Motor Vehicle Theft Prevention Council have paid for the salary of 1 full-time investigator assigned to this task force.**

Community Policing

- **Develops and oversees a variety of specialized programs designed to reach out to the community, promote community involvement and encourage citizens to participate in the law enforcement process.**
- **Create and maintain liaisons with members of the business community, civic organizations, citizen groups, and other government agencies to exchange information and implement ways for the BPD to improve service to the community.**
- **Strong commitment to crime prevention measures and to programs like “Neighborhood Watch” and others which enhance citizen involvement.**
- **Fall, 2005 established VIPS – Volunteers in Police Service and conducted first training session. This program is designed to supplement and enhance existing functions to allow law enforcement professionals to do their jobs in the most professional manner. Volunteers help enhance public safety, maximize resources, and create valuable ties between law enforcement and the community.**

Community Policing

- The Belvidere Police Department conducts Citizen's Police Academies every year. They are designed to give citizens information on protecting themselves from cons, scams, and another crime along with traffic prevention issues.
- Instructors for these academies come from the Belvidere Police Department, Belvidere Fire Department, Boone County Health Department, Retired Senior Volunteer Program, and other Citizens Corp and first responder agencies of Boone County.

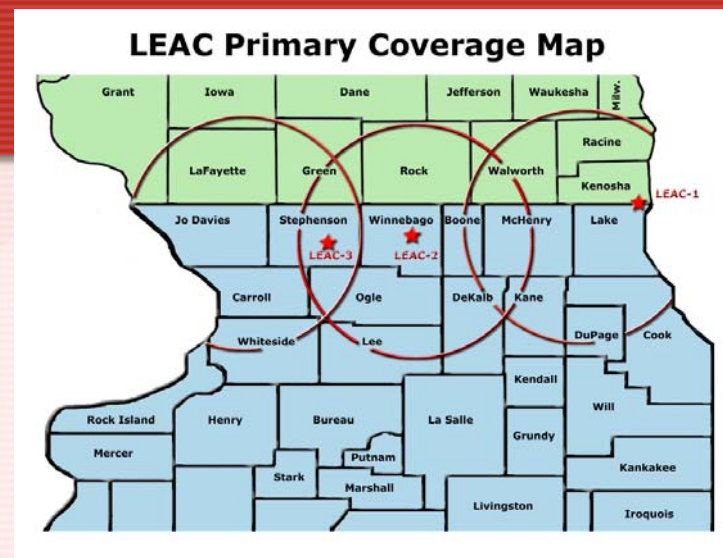

Law Enforcement Aviation Coalition

Explorer Post Program



- **Sponsored by the BPD and Boone County Sheriff's Dept.**

- **The Belvidere-Boone County Explorer Post #2009 presently has 20 male & female members ranging in age from 14 to 20. Explorers volunteered approximately 300 hours of service to our community in 2009.**
- **Sergeant Jerry Temple, Officer Thomas Jones and Officer Julie Grubar serve as advisors from the Belvidere Police Department. Deputy Candy Bunk, Deputy Rich McGill and Deputy Dave Gallano are the advisors from the Boone County Sheriff's Department.**
- **The Post meets on the 3rd Tuesday of every month at 6:00 pm at the Public Safety Building, in the training room. During these meetings there is generally police related training that is instructed by an officer or deputy who has experience in that particular field. Examples of this training include traffic crash investigations, traffic stop procedures and police communications.**
- **Each Explorer is expected to attend all meetings and participate in special events throughout the year. Explorers are permitted to ride along with advisors from the city or county at the discretion of those advisors. Explorers are issued a police style uniform that is expected to be worn at all times when participating in special events.**

Explorer Post Program - Activities
